

January Comment: After the wettest ever December we then get the wettest ever January. The series of Atlantic lows bringing the rain with high winds continued unabated. The land became saturated and, consequently, the channels in the water meadows to the east of the River Iwerne filled with running water from natural springs - rather than the traditional use of sluice gates in the river itself. Watercourses became evident all over the place. Furthermore, fluctuations of the high water table tested the ability of a number of houses to resist becoming flooded by ground water. Water pumps were essential to some households. Temperatures were unusually high and there was a good showing of snow drops.

February Comment: After some serious gales – courtesy of the conveyor belt of Atlantic lows – on 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, the winds eased a little toward the end of the month. That said, numerous trees were flattened and for a time part of the village was without electricity for two days. Scottish and Southern Electricity, somewhat sore from the pasting they received from Parliament following their handling of power outages over Christmas, provided a welcome burger van to help keep the wolf from the door. This was the third wettest February ever and floods in meadows continued throughout month. Swans took up residence in some of the inundations. With 27 inches of rain since 12<sup>th</sup> of December it has definitely been the wettest winter for many, many years. Still generally very mild and our bees have started to fly, bringing in good quantities of pollen and a sense that spring is not far away.

## **DURWESTON CE PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS**

It seems to come round so quickly.... but here we are again: ‘Shroving’.

We are one of the only primary schools which still keeps this old tradition. Mr Valentine Rickman who died on the 3<sup>rd</sup> July 1925 and is buried in the Durweston graveyard left a legacy in his will of £50 to the rector and churchwardens of

Durweston. The yearly interest is distributed once a year on Shrove Tuesday between the hours of 12 noon and 1pm to the children of Durweston school ‘who ..... shall have sung at no less than three other houses in Durweston the old shroving rhyme that has always been sung in the village:

Here we come a  
‘shroving

For a piece of pancake

Or a piece of bacon

Or a little truckle cheese

Of your own making

Blow the fire

Heat the pan

For here we come a ‘shroving

And so once more we all piled into the hall for a quick safety talk before going out onto the streets of Durweston: Handy Paws & Starfish covered Church Road and St Nicholas Gardens, Dolphins & Seahorses classes covered Haycombe, Sharks covered the Houses as far as the war memorial and Porpoises crossed the main road doing Water Lane, down by the mill and the other group of houses further up the main road towards Shillingstone.

The children always thoroughly enjoy the experience. All the children bring flowers from their gardens or local florists to give to the Durweston villagers or lay on their doorstep as a gift ‘from us to you with love’.

We ended the shroving tradition by laying any remaining flowers at the grave of Mr Valentine Rickman.



We hope you enjoyed our visit and thank all those who provided gifts of food, sweets and coins for the children in return. These were much appreciated and help make the experience more enjoyable for all.

The school PTA is already making preparations for our annual May Fair which this year will take place on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May. The children will be taking part in our traditional Maypole dancing and there will be stalls for all to enjoy, as well as refreshments and a display by the White Helmets. All are welcome to come along and join us between 1pm and 4pm.

## **FLOODS IN STOURPAINE 24<sup>th</sup> DECEMBER**

As most will be aware the Havelins was badly flooded in the early hour of the 24<sup>th</sup> of December. Residents knocked their neighbours up and they tried to move furniture, valuables and sentimental pieces before they were ruined. This was not helped by the power cut the whole village was suffering. The other end of Manor Road also was affected. Our heart goes out to those that suffered

By the time most of the village ventured out the water was up to the gate of Havelins Farm. The F&R Service was called but gave scant help other than call for a boat. Villagers rallied, some made tea, and others helped rescue stranded householders and animals. Some opened up their houses, offering food. Thanks to everybody that assisted in any way.

The ongoing effect of the 24<sup>th</sup> is that some have had to leave their houses, repairs will take many months.

We have had a meeting with the MP, still await a reply from the Minister. Several meetings with NDDC, Deborah Croney has been most helpful. Meetings with DCC Emergency Planning who didn't know we had been flooded. The EA Hydrologist, what we can do for the future. Sandbags have been delivered by NDDC , we now have a stock. Individual houses can now make claims through NDDC, to assist in flood alleviation.

The EA will be hosting meetings within the next four weeks, to review the future, what needs doing and when. Stourpaine Parish Council are developing a Flood development plan and will seek funding through NDDC and the Government Scheme. Lyle has redrafted the Flood Plan for Stourpaine, the Parish Council have looked at several early warning systems. They have spoken with manufacturers and parishes that use such equipment. A great deal is going on that you might not be aware of. Please speak to or phone any Parish Council Member for an update.

Anne Wilkins and Phyllis Watt are Wayfinders who provide this support to anyone over 50 in the local area. We do this as part of the Dorset Partnership for Older People's Programme (POPP).

We provide information to individuals or friends and family who need a helping hand to find out about the services and support available. We always try and find an answer, whatever the question. Our POPP team have a large list of contacts and information on a variety of topics, including: Fire Service home safety checks, health services, carers support, home aids, home care, social activities, food, transport and benefits.

If asked for help, we can arrange to visit you at your home and listen to your needs and discuss any concerns you have.

Never imagine that your query is too complex or too small. There are so many services in Dorset, we may be able to tell you about one that you were not aware of and many are free of charge. We don't know everything, but if you ask us something we will make every effort to get the information you need.


Dorset POPP also provide Champions to help the over 50's. Champions support the development of clubs and services in partnership with local communities. When Wayfinders find a gap in the provision of a service, they will inform a POPP Champion to see if they can help. Funding is currently available to support new initiatives for the over 50s. Dorset POPP has funded over 200 projects, from lunch clubs to activities for carers.
